Protecting Primates and Forests in Peru PARTNERING WITH NPC TO WORK WITH NEW VILLAGES

Dear friends of Community Conservation Inc.,

We are beginning some exciting new work in Peru and we need your support. Any amount helps!

Together we hope to expand an existing 11-community conservation network in the beautiful and biodiverse Andean foothills to cover more primate habitat. We're proud to join Neotropical Primate Conservation, a longtime partner of ours, on this project.

These communities are located in the Marañon-Huallaga landscape, a region of endemism within the Tropical Andes, a global biodiversity hotspot. High human population densities make large national parks impossible in most of the area, so community-based conservation provides the perfect alternative.

Ultimately, we plan to reach out to 4 more villages, expanding the current conservation network of 11 communities to 15 total.

Our goal is to raise at least \$5,000 by the end of October so that we can begin work with the first community. Ultimately we will need \$20,000 to complete the work with all four villages.



Community Conservation is joining a project in Borneo, Malaysia in the Lanjak Entimau Wildlife Sanctuary area, home to one of the largest orangutan populations and many other species. The sanctuary is bordered by forests managed by traditional Iban people. The local Iban women are not currently participating in wildlife monitoring, so that will be our first focus.
